Melanoma Reminders

Living in the melanoma capital of Australia as we do, St Vincent's General Surgeon Sally Butchers reminds GPs of some key things to look out for and medical advances

What do you do if your patient has a pigmented lesion? Beyond the basics of taking a history, checking if the lesion has changed or new and reviewing patient's recent sun exposure, the most important thing if you are concerned is to do an initial excisional biopsy.

What are the key prognostic features? Tumour thickness at diagnosis is a key determinant of patient survivability. So early detection and timely referral are crucial in determining good outcomes. Providing regular skin checks for your patients is important.

What are the surgical options? After initial diagnosis of melanoma, a surgical review for wider excision and consideration of sentinel node biopsy (seeing if their melanoma has spread to the glands) is important. If caught early melanoma can be cured with surgery alone.

What are the medical advances? For those with metastatic disease at presentation or who develop metastases after initial treatment, we have more options. Immunotherapy and targeted therapy prolong progression-free and overall survival compared to chemotherapy.

Recommended follow-up. The best follow-up beyond ongoing skin checks is a multidisciplinary approach incorporating the GP, specialists in general surgery, dermatology, oncology, oncologic surgery, and plastic surgery, where appropriate
